NJ Garden State Guarantee (GSG) is New Jersey's scholarship program to third and fourth-year students, which promises to make obtaining a college degree more accessible and affordable. Scholarships cover tuition and all mandatory fees, less other grant aid. These programs are last-dollar financial aid awards.
